# Happy Hope-r Bill Harris





Birthdate: September 11, 1948	Birthplace: Detroit, Michigan

Bill lived in Detroit, Michigan until he was 5 years old and the family moved to the suburbs (Farmington, New Mexico). His father, George, was a Detroit native. His mother, Peggy, was born in Canada., lived in Spokane, Washington but grew up on a farm in North Dakota. George was in the military during WWII. He managed a gas station for many years, then became a mostly self-taught machinist. Peggy was a homemaker and worked at the Farmington Cleaners. Bill's sister (who is about four years older) moved out when Bill was 12 years old. She still lives in Farmington.

After high school, Bill moved to Chicago, Illinois to attend DeVry Institute of Technology to learn electronics. He received a Communications Technician certificate in December 1968. He stayed in Chicago and worked for an electronics company.

With the Viet Nam War happening Bill knew he would be drafted. He asked his mom to find out when he would be drafted. He learned it would be in April or June of 1969. With that in mind, he went to the draft board in March and signed up for the Air Force which was a four-year requirement. (By signing up he avoided the Army or the Marines which typically meant front-line duty.) Bill went to Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas for basic training. While there he got a note to meet with the Captain (it is now June) to discuss his going to Specialist Electronics Technician school. When basic training was over, he went to Lowry Air Force base in Denver, Colorado for school. It was all very easy for him since he had recently graduated from tech school. School lasted almost a year (August 1969 to June of 1970). Three more years to go in his "hitch." When his training was completed, he swapped assignments with another fellow which placed him in a generally undesirable place – Shemya Island. It is part of the Aleutian Islands west of Anchorage. Shemya is a 2 X 4-mile strip of land. This was part of a worldwide network to monitor nuclear activity around the world (and still does today). This assignment lasted from June 1970 to January 1971.

When he was in Denver for school Bill met Gem. They developed a long-distance relationship while he was on Shemya. Bill returned to Denver in June 1971 and they got married. They moved to Alexandria Virginia to headquarters which was referred to as AFTAC. In Sept. 1972 they moved to Patrick Air Force Base in Florida. Bill "separated" from the Air Force in May 1973. They stayed in

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Florida and Bill worked part-time as a DJ in small market radio. Meantime, Gem worked in a bank in Melbourne. They stayed in Florida until December of 1973 and then went back to Denver, Gem's hometown.

Bill got a radio job in Colorado Springs, Colorado. While there, He was offered a job in Denver at a country station. This was a move-up for him since it was a bigger market. He eventually worked up from nights to afternoon drive. Gem had found a job in banking. Bill also got a job teaching at a broadcast school; first part-time and then full-time. He liked this a lot but unfortunately the school went defunct. Bill went back to radio as a news man. Someone Bill knew from school told him about a job as an engineer at KIMN and KYGO. This was in 1979. It was his first full-time job as an engineering technician. In this job he "fixed things, installed equipment, and put things together." Now his career was finally on its way; he started to grow within the field while gaining a reputation. Bill moved into management and became a Chief Engineer. They lived in Denver until 2004 when Bill was hired by Citadel Broadcasting in Albuquerque. Citadel sold to Cumulus Media, the present owners. He 'stepped back' from full-time work in 2015 but still does project work for the radio station group.

Mike and Sarah Synder introduced Bill and Gem to Cross of Hope in early 2005. Bill liked the sermons and the music. He got a real sense of community. Not long after their first introduction, Bill got involved with the Praise Team. 2005 was the first time a service was held outside in the summer. We continue to enjoy it today.

The person who was the bass player for the Praise Team was inconsistent in his attendance. Bill asked if they needed someone to fill in. Bill has been a stable ever since. Bill does not read music but can follow the rhythm. Richard Hielkema was playing bass guitar, but the horn (saxophone) is really his instrument of choice. Bill stepped up to play bass guitar, and later six string rhythm guitar. During COVID he filled a leadership role.

In addition to the Praise Team, Don Lister (the former drummer) introduced Bill to playing with a fiveperson band that did gigs in bars. Bill did this until 2018 when his cancer made it too difficult.

Gem was active as a docent at the Albuquerque Bio Park Zoo. She has a degree in elementary school education with a strong interest in Biology. The docent work was right up her alley since she got to be with groups of children. Docent work requires a lot of education about the different animals so it can be shared with the zoo guests. She was active in this until her osteoarthritis limited her mobility.

Bill is an important anchor on the Praise Team. Give him a "hi" when you can.
